

Whole System Approach

Speech, Language and Communication Needs are the most common area of difficulty in childhood development. The whole system approach offers the right / multiple level(s) of support at the right time.



Universal support is for all children at home, school, and in the community.

Universal support focuses on upskilling the workforce and parents.

<u>Universal level work includes:</u>

- Strategies to create a communication supportive environment.
- Advice to adapt and scaffold the curriculum.
- Drop-in sessions to share generic advice.
- Training on how to identify SLCN
- Sharing strategies to support children/young people.

Targeted support is available for those who need a little extra time and practice to develop a specific communication skill.

A speech and language therapist/assistant will provide training/modelling to school staff.

School staff work in the child's environment and target practice around a particular skill, including small group interventions in or outside of the classroom to help with:

- Answering questions
- Telling stories
- Learning new vocabulary

Specialist support is for children with complex ongoing SLCN, who require regular changes to their programme to support their development or communication success.

Specialist interventions include:

- Shape-coding
- Augmentative and Alternative Communication (AAC) set-up and review
- Speech and Dysfluency interventions



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
